Dear Parents,

The Church's year is nearly complete, and with the solemnity of Our Jesus Christ, King of the Universe (formerly 'Christ the King') this Sunday we leave what is called Ordinary Time and look towards Advent. This is an important time for the children, and over the coming weeks everyone in school will be focussed on prayer and preparation. Often the importance of Advent is overlooked in the race towards Christmas.

Preparing for winter weather

We have been lucky so far that apart from a few autumn rain storms, we have not had any extreme weather this term. A brief look at other areas of the world shows us how violent weather changes can be. The first frosty weather is forecast for the end of the week. Please use this weekend to prepare your child by making sure his or her winter coat is ready, and that hats and gloves are labelled. Remember that hats and gloves should be navy blue. It is important that all clothing items are named.

Mobile telephone use

Please **do not** use your child's mobile phone as a means of changing plans with him or her at the end of the school day. Children are not allowed to use phones at all whilst on the school site to protect everyone from potential safeguarding issues. If you have a change of plans and wish to inform your child, this MUST be done by ringing the school office. The message will then be relayed.

It cannot be stressed enough that if parents continue to call children on their mobile phones as they are leaving school, compelling them to take phones out to respond, all phones for children will be **completely banned from the school site.**

Please do not choose convenience over the safety of everyone in our community.

Health Advice for parents

<u>Coronavirus</u>

When using a test, check that it is a recent one that is set up to detect new strains of the virus.

Group A Strep (streptococci)

Scarlet fever is usually a mild illness, but it is highly infectious. Look out for symptoms in your child, which include a sore throat, headache, and fever, along with a fine, pinkish or red body rash with a sandpapery feel. On darker skin the rash can be more difficult to detect visually but will have a sandpapery feel.
