Key Achievements to date:	Areas for further improvement and baseline of evidence needed
<p>Good provision of clubs and after school activities for children, especially given our limited facilities. A blend of activities from our own professionals and bought-in services.</p> <p>Curriculum provision is good. Children are taught a range of sports across the key areas of PE by qualified sports coaches and teachers.</p> <p>Weekly swimming is offered to all Junior children from Year 3 to Year 6. The swimming teacher is ambitious for the children and representative teams continue to excel in inter-schools competitions in the Borough.</p> <p>Swimming facilities are shared 50:50 with our sister Infant School, and a further offer to three other local schools is part of this arrangement.</p> <p>We have good links with our local secondary schools and are able to use their facilities where possible.</p> <p>We promote competitive sport outside of school and take part in as many inter-school competitions.</p> <p>Children with SEN are included in all provision and their needs are met.</p>	<p>Succession planning: the PE Lead is to leave the school at the end of Autumn Term 2023.</p> <p>There is quality and range in our sports provision – review clubs and enrichment activities. Explore ways in which provision can be targeted to PPG children and how the impact of this offer can be measured.</p> <p>Ensure that in our role as a Food Flagship we engage with children and families to encourage healthy lifestyles – the daily mile, healthy eating, fit clubs. Head Cook to engage with School Council to aid good communication re healthy lifestyle.</p> <p>Once repairs are completed to playground surface, rota the use of the multi-sport area at the end of the playground and target use for the benefit of PPG, SEN and other groups.</p> <p>New PE Lead to engage with other schools to promote sport for girls.</p>
